DEPOSITION *A*Case of *James W. Pinckney*, No. 390650On this 1<sup>st</sup> day of September, 1887, at  
Baltimore, County ofState of Maryland, before me, Henry A. Peed, a  
Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared James  
W. Pinckney, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-  
said pension claim, deposes and says: My name is James

W. Pinckney, my age is 66 years residence  
and post office address 323 Forest Street  
Baltimore, Maryland and I am  
Member of the St. Albans M. E. Church of this city  
I have resided in this city 40 years. I was  
a private in Co B 19<sup>th</sup> Regt U. S. C. Infy. from  
about March 1<sup>st</sup> 1864 until May 20, 1865.  
I had no prior or subsequent military  
or naval service. During the five years  
immediately preceding enlistment I resided  
at No. 12 North Spring Street this city and  
was employed as a porter in the flat of  
John Evans No 15 West Baltimore Street  
dealer in house furnishing goods. Mr  
Evans is dead. I was the only porter in the  
store. Robert Hughes was clerking there. He is  
dead. I was never a slave. I was well  
known by Edmond Ross, Ellen Bright, now  
dead, Margaret Jackson, John Buck, all knew  
me during that time, as did also Thomas  
W. Young and Emory Stout, all of this city.  
I was not sick and had no family  
physician and was not treated before I went  
to the Army. At time of enlisting I was  
examined by two or three doctors but I do  
not know the name of any of them, some  
twenty five or thirty were examined at the time
