

DEPOSITION *CR.*Case of *Jas W. Prindney*, No. 390650.

On this 15<sup>th</sup> day of April, 1888, at  
Baltimore, County of \_\_\_\_\_  
 State of MD, before me, Henry A. Reed, a  
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Rev. John  
W. Diggs, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-  
 said pension claim, deposes and says: My name is John W.

Diggs, my age is 55 years. My residence and  
 post office address is Peppersville, Ford  
and Co., MD, and I am a  
 minister of the Gospel, and am  
 in attendance at the conference  
 of the M. E. Church in this city. I  
 came to this city when a boy and  
 have resided here most of my life.  
 I was a private in Co. B. 19<sup>th</sup> Regt  
 U.S. C. I. and Cavalry during  
 the war from about the last of 1863  
 or first of 1864, I am not certain  
 which it was, until April or May  
 1865. I was in Camp. Belger this  
 city. I had a slight knowledge of Jas.  
W. Prindney the day before  
 he enlisted, or knowing him by sight.  
 He was a sergeant in the Cavalry and  
 I looked with him and saw him  
 more or less every day. He seemed  
 in good health and I heard no word  
 of complaint at time he came  
 to the Cavalry and I thought him  
 as stout a soldier as we had. Our  
 Cavalry and some other numbering  
 in all two or three hundred, went  
 from here to Horpsis Henry, Charles, Benj.
