

DEPOSITION

Case of James W. Pinckney, No. 390650

On this 19 day of April, 1888, at Ballou County of

State of Md, before me, Henry A. Peel, a Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Mary E. Pinckney,

who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: My name is Mary E. Pinckney, my age is 62 years, residence and post office address 323 Forest St. Ballou County, Md, and I am the wife of the claimant, James W. Pinckney. I was married to the claimant at Ballou County, Md. Oct 6, 1844, and have since lived with him as his wife. My husband was a man of good health and was not sick unless from a cold or something like that and did not complain of his head, back, spine, or in any way before he went to the Army. I remember when my husband was in camp at this city as a soldier, but it has been so long that I could not give the date after being in camp, a while he went on an expedition and I did not hear from him for about two weeks and when I did, word came to me that he was sick in camp. This was brought to me by Mary Large, now dead, who had been out to the camp where my husband was stationed. I then went to see him and found him in his tent in camp sick. He had a cold and complaint of a misery in his head and back. I went out on Thursday to see him and on Monday following the requirment would be Annapolis, Md
