

tal since April 22, 1864; from June 30, 1864, to April 30, 1865, absent sick since April 22, 1864. He was mustered out of service at Baltimore, Md. May 25, 1865, in accordance with telegram dated A. G. O. Washington, D. C. May 4, 1865, a patient in McKim Hospital.

The records on file in the office of the Surgeon General U. S. Army, show that the claimant was admitted to G. H. McKim Mansion, Baltimore, Md. April 23, 1864, with typhoid fever, and discharged the service May 25, 1865.

No records of the regiment on file.

There has been considerable testimony filed in this case which tends to show that the claimant was sound at enlistment, that he was sick and in hospital with typho-malarial fever, that when he left the hospital at discharge he was a broken down man, and that he has been a good deal disabled by the results of said fever ever since.

The claimant was examined in 1881, by the Board of Surgeons at Baltimore, Md. who say: "Complains of furtive pains all over body, with weakness, which is due more to old age than typhoid fever."

It does not appear that the papers in this case were ever submitted to the Board of Review ^{or to the Medical Board} of your office, but that it was
