SIR:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your request of Aug. 24th, 1882 for certain information for use in the consideration of application for Pension No. 390,650 and to return it herewith, with the following information from the records of this office:

It appears from the Rolls of U. S. Colored Troops on file in this office that John H. Pinckney was enrolled on the 31st day of March, 1864, at Balto, Cty, Md., in Co. "B", 19th Regiment of U. S. Colored Troops, to serve 3 years, or during the war, and mustered into service as a Private (Regt.) on the 31st day of March, 1864, at Baltimore, Md., in Co. "B", 19th Regiment of U. S. Colored Troops, to serve 3 years, or during the war. On the Muster Rolls of Co. "B" of that Regiment, for the months of from Feb'y 29th to June 30th, 1864 he is reported absent "Sick in Genl Hospital since April 22nd 64"

from June 30th 64 to April 30th 65, "Absent sick since April 22nd 1864"

He was mustered out of service at Baltimore, Md., May 25th, 1865, in accordance with Telegram dated A. G. O. Washington, D. C., May 4th, 1865, - a patient in McKim Hospital.

Revised all rolls subsequent to muster in as James H. Pinckney.

Co. and Regt's records furnish no evidence of alleged disability.
