E. 4th Regt. U.S. Col. Infantry Vols, deceased, and is claimant for a pension, ^{for} which an application has been filed with the Commissioner of Pensions, and numbered No. 120.495.-

She further declares that the best evidence of her marriage which she is able to procure is "an extract of the record in her family bible", and the affidavit of a respectable and credible person who was present at her marriage, which evidence is attached to her application now on file.-

Further that from strict inquiry and investigation she finds that there is no public record of her marriage in the courts, nor has the clergyman who married her a record of said marriage as it was not customary ^{State of Maryland} at the time of her marriage to keep ^{ages} of colored persons.- She never received a ^{marriage} from the minister, and does not now know his address, and consequently cannot obtain one.-
