who served during the late war as 2nd Sgt Co. A. 39 US Inf

and who has been pensioned under Act of June 27, 1890 under

Act. No. 661,747 at the rate of \$10 per month. My memory is very

bad and I can't give dates of my enlistment and discharge. I enlisted

in 1864 or 1865 but I can't fix the season and was discharged in June

having served less than two years. I enlisted here in Baltimore and

was discharged at Goldsboro, N.C.

I never served in any military or naval organization of the United States

other than Co. A 39 US Inf. and I never served in the Confederate Army or Navy

I had up to the date of my enlistment always lived here in Baltimore, Md.

I never had any sickness before I enlisted except small pox when I
