Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared *Alicia Duncan, Clut*, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: *My age is 40 years.*

Postoffice address 904 Hillman St where I have been living since May 16/95 I am an applicant for pension under the new law, under the above number, as the widow of John Duncan in Co. I. 19th U.S.C.T. and who died at the house of Mrs Taylor 507^{or 517} North Spring St. March 20th 1893. He did not die at a Mrs Cooks house. I dont know a Mrs Cook. I am sure it was at Mrs Taylor's 507^{or 517} Spring St. And he was buried at Loudon Park, by the E.A.R. I forgot the name of the Post. I did not pay the funeral expenses but furnished the horse & had to go in to the cemetery.

I was free born in this city, 107 Biddle Alley in 1855. My parents are both dead. I have four sisters living. My maiden name was Alicia Stewart. My husband John Duncan was born a slave, so he always told me, said his master was name — Duncan of Salisbury, Eastern Shore Md. Said that when he left the Army he came to this city and lived here until he died. I became acquainted with him
