

The usual irregularities in the execution of the papers appear. It seems that at Mr Lloyds office when convenient the proper formalities were observed in the preparation of the papers but if not convenient the necessary signatures *jurati* etc to make the paper *prima facie* valid were supplied by his employees or by a subordinate magistrate.

In this case claimant says her application was made about Wednesday two weeks after Solciers death. She fixes on Wednesday because she was usually out washing on Monday and Tuesday. She comes within one day of the date in the *jurat*. She says the paper was drawn up by "Miss Bessie" whom she saw that day for the first time. The declaration is in the hand writing of Mrs Bessie B. Tuers. She is now a clerk in Mr Lloyds office.

She says Miss Bessie then sent her to the *Magistrate* a few doors away to be sworn to it. *Magistrate* *Tutman*
