who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: I am in my 39<sup>th</sup> year

I live at 616 McElderry Road, Baltimore, Md. which is my post office address. My occupation is washing and ironing and scrubbing and any thing I can get to do.

I am the widow of John Luncan, and claim a pension as his widow. He was in Co. I, 19. Regt. or 39<sup>th</sup> Regt. I have his discharge at home.

I was free born in this city. My maiden name was Alice Stewart. I was never married before my marriage to John Luncan and I have not married any body, nor lived or cohabited with any man since his death.

I was married to him on a Thursday night, the 5<sup>th</sup> of April 1850, at the residence of Mr. Fry, a white Presbyterian minister who lived at the corner of Broadway & Fayette St. in this city. There were present at that marriage no witnesses except Elya Smith and her husband Edward Smith. We got a certificate of marriage from the preacher but it got destroyed or lost out of the frame. The time there was a fire at Co. of Cadets & Fayette St. Our place almost burnt but we were picking up & moving out in fear that
