The pole which he was carrying fell just across the small of Johnson's back, and hurt him so badly that the man who was with him had to help him up. He then went to the Dr. who sent him to camp hospital for a month, about. Then ^{he} came back to his company, but was no good, then the Dr. made a nurse of him and sent him to hospital at W' Kim Hill Balto Md. After Johnson was injured, and while in camp at Benedict Md. and up to the time he was sent to Balto Md. he complained to me that his back was painful and troubled him greatly.

I do not remember that Johnson had a cough while in the army or after mustering out, when I saw him - or being blind, I should say much him, which I did occasionally up to the date of his death.

I do recall that during the last year or two of his life Johnson had a bad cough.

After discharge when ever I met Johnson ^{he} always complained of his back.

The pole Johnson was carrying was about 12 feet long and as I remember about 8 inches in diameter at the butt end which Johnson had to carry when he fell.

Saw Johnson fall and know he was badly hurt.

Am not related to deceased soldier or interested in this claim for pension.
