 Condition of the Head.

No. I can't say that he was
 disabled in his legs or Reuptum
 after he returned home.

He was not the man he
 was after he came home I
 know that well.

For as much as ten years past
 he has been unfit to do Manual
 Labor.

For as much as 10 years after the
 war he was able to do a good amount
 of work and receive as
 much wages as any one.

Yes, I was a witness for the C. & G.
 (Capt. read.)

The Rheum mentioned therein
 refers to his head.

No he did not tell me any-
 thing about his Reuptum.

No kin. No interest. Some
 questions are understood &
 my answers are correctly
 recorded.
