DEPOSITION 7Case of James Taylor - C/P, No. 887349.

On this 20th day of July, 1890, at
Cordova, County of Talbot
 State of Maryland, before me, W. H. Armstrong, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared
Simon Doran —, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid
 pension claim, deposes and says: Age, about 65 - Occupation -
Farmer. P. O. Cordova Md. and reside 1/2 mile.

I was a Corp. & private in Co. K. 39.
 M.S.C. Regt. from Feb. 1864 and dis-
 charged Dec. 1865 -

I have a pension claim pending.
 I first knew Taylor after I became
 a soldier and only knew him while
 we were in the U.S. Army -

I cannot remember that the
 claimant was wounded, injured or
 contracted any disease while in
 the army. I was not his bunk or tent
 mate -

I cannot remember that he had the
 mumps or was ruptured or injured
 in any manner in his private life during
 his army service.

I can't recall that he suffered
 with Rheum. in any manner in the
 army - So far as I can remember
 Taylor was in good health when we
 came home - No insanity. No trial
 for questions or understood & my answers
 are correctly recorded -
