Case of Mary E Cornish

On this 3 day of August, 1920, at Baltimore county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me, W.H.Stovall, a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared Thomas Davis, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am 68 years old, occupation laborer, and post office address 900 Shields Place, Baltimore Md.

I have lived in this city all of my life and am a cousin of the late Joseph Cornish and I recollect when he went into the army. I used to live in the same section of Baltimore as Cornish when he had his second wife and I lived with him when he was with the first one. I know that he left his second wife and it was due to him being old and in his dotage. He lived down this street, Biddle street, after leaving Mary Cornish and I saw him often to the day of his death and attended his funeral.

I do not see Mary Cornish very often since the death of Joseph Cornish and we are not neighbors or residents of the same section of Baltimore. See her two or three times per year probably and I have heard of no marriage on her part since the death of Joseph Cornish.

Q. How has Mary acted since the old mans death?

A. All right as far as I know. I have not known her to live with any other men. She did not take up with any other man while separated from Cornish, and I know this by living in the same house that she did a short time. She lived in that little street around the corner from here but I do not recollect the name of that street.

I remember the man Jackson who lived at the house of Mary and Joe Cornish and I forget how long he was there and have not seen him since he left Marys house. He was
