Case of Mary E. Cornish

On this 7 day of August, 1920, at Baltimore county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me,

W.H. Stovall, a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared Almira Chase, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am 38 years old, occupation housekeeper, and post office address 1824 Druid Hill ave, Baltimore Md.

I am the widow of Noah Chase, and have lived in this city since I was a small child and am a sister of Mary

E Cornish and of course I was acquainted with her husband Joseph Cornish and I know that Mary has not married

again since his death. She and I are not neighbors and I do not see her often as we both are out in service.

I have lived in Druid Hill avenue over fifteen years and sister Mary lived in the block below me at one time and moved from there to Harford avenue and to several other places since. She was in Harford avenue at the time that

Joseph Cornish died and his death occurred in Pine street. I know that Joseph and Mary Cornish were separated for

some time before his death and the trouble was that he had crazy spells and he was taken to the station house once.

Q. Who was living at her house at the time Cornish died?

A. Her daughter Millie May and wait I am wrong, she was not with her mother, but her daughter Thelma and Albert her son and Joseph Cornish Jr and one boarder named Jackson and there may have been some ladies boarding at sisters house then but I dont know for certain.

I knew the man Jackson who boarded with Mary Cornish and he was with her • dont just know as he went with her to Harford avenue and I dont know when he left.
