

28 Q. What about the man Jackson? A. He rented a room at
29 mothers house before father died and she had him put out of
30 the house in Harford avenue because of threatening her and
31 running everybody out. I dont know Jacksons full name. He
32 was not a pensioner. Was a laborer, and I knew none of his
33 people. I have not seen Jackson since fathers death. My
34 mother was in Harford avenue before fathers death and it was
35 soon after his death that she had Jackson put out. I went
36 to mothers house in Harford avenue a couple of weeks after
37 fathers death and Jackson was then out and I do not really
38 know how long he had been out. I have not seen the fellow
39 since and he must be either dead or not living in Baltimore.
40 My mother was scared of Jackson who had a habit of taking
41 authority around her house after father got out but I never
42 saw him in her bed or occupying the same room as mothers.
43 Jackson rented a room upstairs at mothers house in Druid
44 Hill avenue and her room was the down stairs front room.

46 Q. Was Jackson living there the cause of your father
47 leaving your mother? A. No I dont think so. Father got
48 old and saw that he had to much on himself so he pulled
49 out. He took up with no woman after he left mother. I
50 was with him four months of the time.

51 Q. Did Jackson cohabit with your mother?

52 A. I cant say. I never saw anything of the kind. But
53 he had an evil influence over mother, he was a peculiar kind
54 of a man, an evil men, and he could make you do things you
55 did'nt want to do. I do not recall writing a letter to the
56 U S Pension Bureau relative to mothers conduct with Jackson
57 and want to see the letter and the wrbting before I will
58 acknowledge it.

60 Q. You stated to the Pension Bureau two days after the
61 death of Joseph Cornish that your mother was living with
62 Jackson? A. I wrote that letter, having examined it and
