

Q. Who identified you as Jim E. Wheeler?
 A. No one. The colored man who was there with Lizzie Wheeler knew me because he was in my regiment - but Lizzie Wheeler knew me. No sir, I do not remember the name of the colored man but I know he was in my regiment. I do not know where he lived then nor where he is now. (Jno. Boston, identifying witness, was one of Lizzie's personal witnesses. He was a member of Co. C, 30th U.S. C.T. and is now at Hq. 1st Div. Hampton Va. - Ex-mr) No sir, I do not know a man named Frank Rice - who used to be in Mr. Lhyds office. I do not remember any fat man there but the Squire who swore me to my application. I do not know B. B. Tress, or Frank J. McDermott. I know John Boston a colored man - at least I know a colored man named Boston who was in the army but I do not know his first name. No sir, he was not the colored man who was in Lhyds office when I applied for pension. No one signed or swore to my application but myself. The man Boston I know was not there when I applied for pension. No sir, I had no witnesses the first time I was there but about a year after, when I sent in for increase I got Joshua Cook and Alex. Cooper to witness for me as to having they had been knowing me. They knew about my sickness too. After my pension was allowed I applied for an increase. That was about a year after I got my first pension. When I applied for increase I had to go to a Squire there down from Mr. Lhyds office that was the same day that Joshua Cook and Dependent
