

DEPOSITION 6.

Case of Sarah Adams, No. 1,009,977

On this 1st day of February, 1911, at
Frederick, county of Frederick,
 State of Maryland, before me, Frederick Johnson, a
 Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared
Frederick Johnson who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special
 examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

1 named Lavinia, I don't know anything about her.
 2 I never knew this claimant until after she was
 3 married to my said brother. I met her for the first
 4 time when I visited my said brother in Baltimore,
 5 several years after the close of the war, as stated.
 6 My said brother died here in Philadelphia last
 7 May, 1904, I was at his funeral. He had lived here
 8 in Philadelphia for several years just before his
 9 death and I saw him frequently while he lived here.
 10 Yes Sir, this claimant, ^{and my said brother} always lived together here as
 11 man and wife; I certainly know that, Yes, I testified
 12 in this claim before [B. J. 11] Yes, I served in the
 13 army, Co. D - 9th U.S.C., under the name of White
 14 Frederick White. If I testified in my original affidavit
 15 that the wife, May, died in the year, 1876, I cannot
 16 explain it if I will say here that I did not make
 17 any such statement either and I would not have
 18 sworn to it had I known that was in that affidavit
 19 for I certainly cannot state the year she died. Nor
 20 do I know the date of this claimant's marriage to
 21 my said brother and I did not knowingly make any
 22 such statement as that in my affidavit. This
 23 deposition has been read to me, questions understood
 24 only my name and correctly recorded herein. The
 25 words, "and my said brother" line 10, were interlined before
 26 signing.
