Post-Office address, well known to me to be reputable and entitled to credit, and who,
being duly sworn, declare in relation to aforesaid case, as follows:

We are well and personally acquainted with the Claimant Richard Dayricks, on acquaintance with him continued from our enlistment, and do know that at his enlistment he was a strong, healthy and able bodied man free from any disease whatever, in fact he was a man of good sound Physical health. We all enlisted about the same time in the same Company and Regiment, that during our Army service we conversed with him daily, and were tent mates together, and very intimate friends together. We do recollect the fact distinctly that whilst the Claimant was in the line of duty at Petersburg Va on or about July 1864, the said Claimant from exposure and lying out in all kinds of weather contracted Rheumatism, and complained to us of severe pains all through his body. Also was attacked with Malaria & Chills and Fever at the same place, complained to us of severe pains in the region of his heart was very nervous and completely broken down in health, that on the 30th day of July 1864 the Claimant was severely injured in the left side by a missile from the enemy's line wounding him internally and caused him a great deal of pain, we were present and saw him struck as aforesaid, that during our Army service we went through a great deal of ex-
