 duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her
 during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension,
 deposes and says:

I am 25 years old, occupation housewife, and post office
 address 787 Sarah Ann St, Baltimore Md. I am the wife of
 Joseph Wilson, teamster, and I have known Alice Barker all
 my life practically as my parents moved into this street
 when I was a little child and I have been here ever since.
 I know that Alice Barker has not married again since the
 death of Adam Barker, and she has gotten a support by wash-
 ing and working out by the day: she has people in Freemont
 street she has worked for for years, and for Mr Goldsborough
 of Saratoga street. I see Alice almost every day. She has
 been known to the residents of this street by the name of
 Alice Barker ever since I have known her. I dont recollect
 her husband Adam Barker. I am not related to claimant and
 have no pecuniary interest in her pension claim. Our asso-
 ciation has been such I would certainly have known of any
 marriage on her part since the death of Adam Barker, or rather
 since I became of an age sufficient to observe such things.
 Your questions were fully understood and my answers are re-
 corded correctly in this deposition which I have heard read.
