On this 27 day of August, 1917, at Baltimore
county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me,
W. H. Stovall, a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions,
personally appeared Ellen Planter, who, being by me first
duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her
during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension,
deposes and says:

I am 57 years old, occupation housekeeper, and post office
address 769 Sarah Ann St, Baltimore Md. I am the widow of
Steven A. Planter, a laborer. I have known Alice Barker
for 25 or 30 years and I fix this period by the time I
moved to this street, and we have been in this block together
most of the time since, and I know that she has not married
again since the death of Adam Barker. I was well acquainted
with Adam. Alice Barker has obtained a support by her
daily labor like the rest of us poor people in this narrow
street. She takes in washing, and one of her boys helps
her some. She looks foolish but her mind seems to be right.
Alice Barker has borne that name ever since I have known
her. I am not related to claimant, and I have no pecuniary
interest in her pension claim. I would certainly have known
of any remarriage on her part as I see her almost every
day. Your questions were fully understood and my answers
are recorded correctly in this deposition which I have heard
read.
