applied for pension in June

me. We were all three sworn.
They identified me to be Adam
Barker's widow. They also testified
for me the same day.

I first knew Adam Barker
 at his brother Ed's in Morrison
alley. I was nt. 16 then. I knew
him about six months before he
got me knocked up. I was living
with my mother Mary Scott at
#6 Morrison alley. Adam visited
me there. He never occupied
a room with me before he went
away, but he gave me money to
support myself and sent me
money after he went into the
