 said pension claim, deposes and says: I am 56 yrs old. Laborer

I am the identical person who served in 139  
U. S. C. Inf. under the name of James Armstead  
Capt. Rank commanded the company  
enlisted and served about 22 months and  
was discharged about Christmas or a little before  
in 1865. I think I enlisted in March and I think  
it was 1863. But I am sure I was discharged  
in Dec. 1865 and I had served continuously  
about 22 months. I had no prior, nor subse-  
quent service in the army, navy, nor marine  
service.

I claim pension for rheumatism in my  
legs and shoulders and arms, dyspepsia,  
flies, a fluttering pain at the heart, back,  
and malarial poisoning and chills.

When I applied for pension I am sure I stated  
each of these disabilities unless it was about  
the fluttering of the heart.

I have, at times, a dimness of my eyes but  
I don't remember if I said anything about  
that.

I lived in this city on Raborg St. near Carrollton  
ave. when I enlisted. I have been living  
right here in this city ever since I was a  
small boy. I think I lived on Raborg St.
