

grooming horses and cleaning harness, I continued in his employ about six months, and went to driving private carriage for Thomas Scanahan, continued in his employment six years, then quit him of my own accord Dr Buckler (since dead) told me that sitting so much did not agree with me, and advised me to get a horse and drag or cart, that I would then have more walking to do, and my health would be better, I took his advice bought a horse and cart, and have done hauling of various kinds for a living ever since.

Q What proportion of time have you been disqualified for purposes of manual labour by reason of functional disease of stomach since your discharge, year by year,

A I have never been able to do hard work at laboring since I was discharged I could work sometimes right hard for a half day and would then give out but I could generally attend to light work, while driving my own cart I can take things as easy as circumstances will allow, I don't work hard or long hours

Q Did you lose any time on account of sickness while working for Arthur Mann, or Thomas Scanahan, If so, how much.

A I lost about four weeks while working for Arthur Mann, and about one month while working for Mr Scanahan.

Q Did Scanahan and Mann pay you fair wages,

A Arthur Mann gave me ten dollars per week, Thomas Scanahan paid me forty dollars per month, that was good wages, better than is now paid for same kind of labour,

Q Have you been laid up in bed sick for any considerable length of time in our spell since you left Thomas Scanahan's employ,

A I was laid up nearly all winter before last with pain in my back Dr Gardner said that was lumbago, I have been laid up with my stomach a few times, but not more than a week at a time. I have not lost much time on account of my stomach,

Q When do you desire the further examination of your claim to proceed,

A Whenever it is convenient to you.

Q Do you desire to be present during the examination or do you desire any particular person to represent you

A I will be present.

Q Is there anything further you desire to say at this time,

A Nothing that I can think of except that Col. Brown was not Provost Marshal but Chief Mustering Officer for Coloured Troops.
