On this 4 day of September, 1883, at
Baltimore, County of Baltimore

State of Maryland, before me, James H. Clements, a
Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Samuel T. Fisher

, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
said pension claim, deposes and says: his age is 55 years, resides at No. 3 Tension Street

Baltimore Md. Is well acquainted with the Claimant, knew him well before
he enlisted was intimate with him and his family, the Claimant was a Coach-
man for a Guano Merchant named Barelle or Baralle, for a long while,
his whole life since Claimant first knew him has been spent as a driver
or handler of horses, he (Claimant) was a healthy hearty man to best
of deponents knowledge, and to all appearances when he enlisted, never
knew him to be sick before that time,

Q Have you any personal knowledge of Claimants duties aside from driving
Carriage while he was in the employ of the said Guano Merchant,

A He did nothing but drive the Carriage and take care of the horses, I was
then Porter for P. Tiernan & Son No. 12 N. Calver Street, Grocers, I
was often at the house of Barelle with goods, and was intimate with
Claimant

Q Do you know anything personally of Claimant while he was in the service

A I often saw him while he was acting as Orderly for Colonel Bowman
but don't know anything about his health while he was in the service

Q Do you know anything of his physical condition at date of his discharge
and since,

A I met him at his house soon after he was discharged, I can't give
the date, he was then feeble and complained of being sick at the stomach
and pains in his stomach, he afterwards went to work at Arthur Manns
Stables, and then drove a Carriage for Mr. Ganahan, and since then
he has carted for himself but I can't fix the dates of his various em-
ployments, but I have often heard him complain of the pains in
his stomach, and of sick stomach in all the years since his discharge

Q Do you know whether Claimant was compelled to lose any time while
in the employ of Arthur Mann, or Mr. Ganahan, on account of the
