*Mr Rosier died in June 31<sup>st</sup> 1901, and I sold the house to a Mr. George Samms, who now lives in the house - He gave me \$800<sup>00</sup> for it, and I turned that money, after all expenses had been paid, about \$600<sup>00</sup> over to my mother to repay her for the money she had loaned on the house that is to buy it - No, Sir, I have absolutely nothing to depend upon except my own labor. I could not keep the house after my husband's death and so I sacrificed it, and I took a small house (\$11<sup>00</sup> per month) on Eddin Street (receipts for rent of said house exhibited to the Examiner) but I found I could not afford it and so I moved into two rooms (with the use of the kitchen and place to do my laundry - I pay for this \$9<sup>00</sup> a month I have nobody who is legally bound to support me and I have only my daily labor to depend upon. We never had any children.*

*Q When you first met your husband you say he was that day discharged and was wearing his military uniform*

*A Yes Sir.*

*Q Now what name did he give you as his Christian name.*

*A None then, but his mother introduced him as her son Elbert, and I knew him by that name in a little while as we commenced to keep company right off - His mother <sup>most</sup> always*
