On this *twelfth* day of *May*, 190*2*, at *Baltimore City*, county of _____ State of *Maryland*, before me, *Edward Howard*, a special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared _____

Elizabeth Hurdy, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am 79 years of age. I have no occupation now, being too old to work, and I live with my daughter the claimant at 525 Mosher Street, Baltimore.

I met my daughter's husband about 3 months after he left the army - No Sir I can't remember the year, but I knew his mother about 2 years before the war ended, and I used to visit my daughter at the same house as they were fellow servants, Mrs Rosier being Cook and my daughter, the claimant, housemaid. I there met her son who afterwards married my daughter, His mother called him Elbert and he always said that was his right name but most of his companions called him Elby and he said they used to call him Elberry in the Army as a nick name. Yes Sir he is the same man who was in the army as Elby and was married to my daughter under the name of Elbert - No Sir, I don't know now any of his old comrades but long years ago. They used to come and see him.

No Sir, my daughter was never married before she married Mr. Rosier - I raised her right here in Baltimore and she was married at my home and we have lived together ever since. She has not remained since Mr Rosier's death, but has remained a widow and has not lived or cohabited with any other man.
