On this *fifteenth* day of *May*, 1902, at
Baltimore City, county of _____
 State of *Maryland*, before me, *Edward Howard*, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared _____

Rebecca Singer, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special
 examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

I am *43* years of age, my occupation is that
 of a *landress*, and I reside at *371 W. Preston*
Street, Baltimore, Md.

I know the claimant well, and have
 known her since she was a girl. Her maiden
 name was *Elizabeth C. Hardy*, and she is my
 second cousin. She was raised right here in
Baltimore and I saw her most every day
 up to the time of her marriage to *Mr. Rosier*
 in 1870, and I have seen her most every week
 since as we are both members of the same church.

I am quite certain that claimant never
 married anybody before she married *Mr. Rosier*.
 I knew her husband *Elby Rosier* about a
 year before he married claimant - I can't say
 of my own knowledge whether he had ever been
 previously married, but I never heard that he
 had been.

Q Did you ever hear him called by any other name
 than *Elby Rosier*?

A No, Sir. That is the only name I knew him by.

Q Did you ever hear him called *Elbert*?

A No, Sir, never.

Q Did claimant ever tell you her husband's right
 name was *Elbert*?

A No, Sir.

As to claimant's income, I know she has
 only what she earns. They did own a house
 at *1309 Division Street*, which she sold for
