

DEPOSITION

Case of Harriet Wesley, No. 589452

On this 18 day of May, 1894, at Baltimore, County of City, State of Md., before me, Thos. W. Hardwick, a Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared Harriet Wesley, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of afore-said pension claim, deposes and says: I am 49 yrs. old.

Occupation: washing + ironing.

Residence + address 1305 Bunt St. this city.

I am the identical person who claims a pension as the widow of John Wesley, late of E 39 U. S. C. I. S. I don't know when he enlisted or was discharged. John Wesley died Jan 7, 1894 at 1305 Bunt St. this city of paralysis.

I married him July 19, 1878. Rev. James Thomas of this city performed the ceremony at #14 Upton St. I have furnished a record of that marriage to the Pension Department.

My maiden name was Harriet Brummel.

Neither my husband nor myself had any prior marriage. I had known him 2 or 3 yrs. before I married him. I have four living children by this soldier:—Lillie Wesley, Wm. H. Wesley,

Sarah C. Wesley, and Martha L. Wesley. I have the dates of their birth recorded by I can not remember them. I have not remarried nor lived with any man since my husband died.

I have no means of support by my own manual labor.

I went to Mr. Lloyd's office about 2 or 3 weeks after my husband died and made application for pension in my own name.
