

appeared Margaret Ella Dickerson, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her, deposes and says: I will be 35 the 10th of next month. Occupation, laundry work. Residence, 1219 Wilmer Alley, Baltimore, Md. I am the widow of Stephen Dickerson, who died March 1st. I have known Harriet Wesley fully 17 years. Her name was Harriet Trummer when she married John Wesley. I had known her about 2 years at the time of her marrying. She must have known her own husband I understood from her at that time that she had never been married before. I first met John Wesley a short time after I met Harriet and before their marriage. I remember hearing that he had had another wife, but I do not know her name, and I know him as a single man when he married Harriet. I heard that his first wife was dead at the time. I did not attend Harriet's wedding, but I saw her a couple of days after their marriage. They were never divorced but lived together till his death, which was in January or February, 1894. I saw his dead body and attended the funeral. Harriet has not remarried since John's death. She has no property except her furniture and clothes not worth more than \$100 at the outside. She earns her living at laundry work.

My husband and Harriet came from Caroline county and he knew her some time, some years, I suppose (perhaps all his life) before I did. I think my husband knew Wesley before I did but I would not say how long.

Harriet has four children, under 16 living, Lily, Tom, Catherine and Martha. I could not tell their ages. The youngest is about 10. She is younger than my youngest. I don't know her birthday, though I know them all from their birth.

I remember testifying at Lloyd's Caroline place with me there, and I went with Harriet to the old post office. I testified just about the same as I have to you. My husband went to Lloyd's once but I was not with him. He went to testify to some mistake about the name in the license, that he was the one that bought the license. It was James instead of John on the license.

When I testified at Lloyd's the papers were read to me there, and I went into the magistrate below there to be sworn. Yes, I said at Lloyd's that neither John Wesley nor Harriet had been married before they married each other, to my knowing. I had heard that he had had another wife, but I did not know it. This statement has been read to me and is correct.
