

DEPOSITION *A*

On this *7th* day of *February*, 189*7*, at
Baltimore, County of *Montgomery*
State of *Md.*, before me, *McCutcheon*, a
Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared *Edward*
Snodgrass, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer

truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
said pension claim, deposes and says: I am about 68 years
old. Residence *608 W. Lawrence St. - Baltimore*
Md.. I am a shoe cobbler. I am the
identical *Edward Snodgrass* who served
during the war of the Rebellion in Co.
39 U.S.C.T. and am now in receipt of
a pension of \$12 a month under the new
law.

My first and only application for
pension was made a short time after
the law of June 27, 1890 was passed.
I went to Mr. A. P. Loyd's office on
E. Lexington St. - Baltimore - Charles St.
the city to make that application. I took no
one with me the first time I went there
save only that I took my two witnesses
John Turner and *Geo. W. Hays* to his
new office where he is now a cor-
St. Paul and Saratoga St.. These wit-
nesses met me at Mr. Loyd's office on
different days. My application was made
up by a younger looking man than *Wm. L.*
Scott - that it was the young man that
is at Mr. Loyd's office now. I was sworn
to that application by taking hold of a bar.
I don't remember of any one being sworn to
me when I made my application.
