Atlantic City, county of Atlantic
 State of N. J., before me, B. M. Morris, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared

Elizabeth Borman, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this special

I am 29 years of age; my post-office address is 211 N.

I reside in the adjoining house to
 Mrs Jobes, and we have been
 neighbors for two years past. I
 did not know her before.

I know her as Mrs Jobes and
 by no other name. She is
 said to be a widow. She is a
 laundress, she takes in washing
 and earns her living.

A. Mrs Lindsay who is a ser-
 vant in a private family
 and who comes home occa-
 sionally at night, occupies
 part of the house with Mrs
 Jobes. There is a lodger in the
 house, I don't know him. He
 is very much younger than this
 claimant. He is simply and only
 a lodger.

Mrs Jobes' reputation in the
 neighborhood is very good. She
 is a church member.

No man has lived with
 her as a husband since I
 have known her.

I never heard her reputation
