Case of **Mary G Jobes**

On this 14 day of July, 1930 at Baltimore
county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me,
W. H. Stovall, an inspector of the Bureau of Pensions,
personally appeared Mary G Jobes, who, being by me first
duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to her
during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension,
deposes and says:

1 I am past 70 years old and the widow of Jeremiah Jobes,
2 post office address 532 Conway st, Baltimore Md. This
3 is my address since I was throw n out of the last place.
4 I claim a pension as the widow of Jeremiah Jobes and
5 will show you this old paper which gives his service and
6 the number of my claim. I filed the claim soon after the
7 death of Jeremiah Jobes but have had no person to give
8 me the right understanding in the matter and dont know
9 why a pension has not been allowed to me. My husband
10 Jeremiah Jobes served with Co K 30 Md Colored Troops and
11 the number of my claim is 617413. He died in Baltimore
12 in 1895 and I have not remarried since his death. I have
13 lived in Baltimore since I was 16 years old but was born
14 in Queen Annes County Md and my parents were Joshua and
15 Harriet Martin, both dead, and I have no living sisters
16 but may have brothers living but I dont know where they
17 strayed off to. I married the soldier Jeremiah Jobes
18 in Stockholm street in Baltimore with a license and it
19 is of record at the City Court House and I had been with
20 him twenty one years when he died. It may have been
21 1877 that we were married. We were never separated or
22 divorced. We had no children. I had one child before I
23 married Jeremiah Jobes, a daughter that died when six
24 months old, her father was Luther Hawkins of Baltimore
25 who is now dead. I did not marry Hawkins nor live with
26 him as a wife or housekeeper. He had no service. I was
27 not married before my marriage to Jeremiah Jobes. Jobes
