Saw him two or three times in his last sickness
and knew that the easiest position, the one in
which he could breathe easiest was in a
sitting position in a reclining chair.
Was not with him when he died.

Knew that claimant and soldier while I knew
them lived together, and were recognized
as man and wife and that
claimant has not remarried since
the death of soldier.

In regard to claimant's children I can say
that I performed the ceremony of baptism
for three (3) of them, and that I had the
date of their baptisms on a piece of
paper which I handed to the attorney
for claimant when I made an affidavit
for him, and that paper was retained by
the said attorney.

The record I had now made for the
said claimant had in his title.

Did not make any record of the date when
I baptized the children, and all I knew as
to the age of the children was obtained from
claimant's record.

Do for a fact know that I baptized
three of claimant's children, but I
cannot state of my own knowledge
the correct age of either of them.
