

DEPOSITION *A.*Case of *Rebecca Ernolds*, No. *580,099*.

On this *16th* day of *April*, 1894, at
Baltimore City, County of *...*
 State of *Md*, before me, *Geo. D. Tidman*, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared *Rebecca*
Ernolds, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of aforesaid
 pension claim, deposes and says:

Supplemental to my statement of this date,
 as to the merits of my claim for pension,
 and answering your questions I have to
 state that *A. Parlett Lloyd* is my attorney
 for the prosecution of my claim for pension.
 My husband was buried on a Sunday and
 on Monday morning I went to *Lloyd's* office
 and applied for pension. *Miss Bessie*, the
 lady clerk at *Lloyd's* office (*B. B. News*) picked up
 the papers for me to sign the first day I went
 there. I touched the pen to the paper the
 first day and *Miss Bessie* sent for *Esquire*
Tubman who came in and swore me. I
 was sworn on a big bible - bigger than
 yours there - the first day but I had no
 witnesses with me then. The next day
 (*Tuesday*) I took my two witnesses up there,
Miss Lizzie Lunday and *Ms. Kitty Conroy*, and
 they signed my papers. This time *Miss Bessie*
 took us to *Esquire Tubman's* office, 243
 door below *Lloyd's* office, who swore all three
 of us to the papers. The first day I was there
Miss Bessie made her paper for me to
 sign and swear to. The next day she made
 three papers - one for me to sign and me
 each for my two witnesses to sign. I do not
 know for sure but I think the witnesses also did
