I have personally known *Rebecca Ennolds* this about since long before the war about 7 years before the war. When I first knew her she lived in *Welcome Alley* with her Aunt. We always called her Aunt - "Aunt *Petsy*." I did not know her since and she was single when I first knew her and used to work about the same as I did. I knew her husband, *James Ennolds*, all my life time. He came from *Dorchester Co. Md.* I remember when *Jim Ennolds* and *Rebecca Smith* were married. I was present and saw them married. They were married by *Rev. Salmon Jackson* who came here from *Cambridge Md.* He used to come here to *Baltimore* quite often and he was in a visit here at the time he married the claim to *Jim Ennolds*. The marriage ceremony was performed at *Aunt Petsy's* home in *Welcome Alley*. There was quite a number of people there at the time. My husband, *Dennis Cornish*, was there & *Aunt Petsy* was there but both ~~are~~ dead now. I do not remember any other persons who were there at the time. I have known *Rebecca*
