

DEPOSITION *l.*Case of *Emeline Jolley* widow, No. 227,082

On this *twenty fifth* day of *November*, 1884, at
Baltimore, County of *Baltimore*
 State of *Maryland*, before me, *J. H. Simpson*, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared
George L. Brown, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
 said pension claim, deposes and says: that his age is 36 years;
 that he is by occupation a barber;
 that his post office address and place of residence
 is No 61 Clay Street, Baltimore, Md, and
 that he was acquainted with the deceased soldier,
John Jolley, late Private Co. "D." 7th Regt. U.S.C. 7, from
 the time of his discharge up to about the time of his
 death, also met him occasionally in said city
 during the year or two immediately previous to his,
 the deceased soldier, enlistment.

Q. What was the deceased soldier's physical condition
 while you knew him prior to enlistment?

A. I only knew him by sight prior to enlistment, &
 was but a boy then, and saw him occasionally
 when he came up from *Dorchester County, Md.* He was
 then a stout built man but I have no knowledge as to
 his condition then.

Q. When did you first meet him subsequent to discharge?

A. I first met him at my barber shop, then on Light
 Street, very soon after he returned from the army, I had
 just moved onto Light St. that was in 1866 and
 I met him soon afterwards.

Q. What was his condition when you first met him
 subsequent to discharge?

A. He was in very poor health. Had a very bad cough
 spit up blood and phlegm, I always hated to share
 him his breath was so bad. He then told me that
 he believed he had caught the consumption while in
