

DEPOSITION 9Case of Emeline Jolley, No. 227,082

On this twenty sixth day of November, 1884, at  
Baltimore, County of Baltimore  
 State of Maryland, before me, A. H. Simpson, a  
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared

John F. Brown, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-  
 said pension claim, deposes and says: that his age is 55 years;

that he is by profession a physician; that his post-  
 office address and place of residence is No 267  
Montgomery Street, Baltimore, Md. and that he was  
 acquainted with the deceased soldier, John Jolley,  
 late Private Co. "D," 7<sup>th</sup> Regt. U.S.C. from about the time  
 of his discharge from the service up to the date  
 of his death.

Q. Did you ever treat the deceased soldier for any disease  
 or disability?

A. Yes sir, I treated him for disease of lungs prior to  
 his marriage, and I am under the impression that  
 I first treated him for this disease very soon after his  
 discharge. He was a great church man and boarded  
 with Thomas Mitchell <sup>or the widow Talliens</sup> deceased, just in the rear of our  
 church soon after the war. I first treated him while  
 he boarded with said Mitchell. I gave him prescriptions  
 off and on for disease of lungs from the time of my  
 first treatment up to the <sup>time</sup> date of his fatal illness.  
 When he became too weak to go out I sent for me  
 and I visited him for probably a month and up  
 to the very hour of his death, I was present when  
 he died. I think he died about the first of August  
 1871. I have no record of his treatment or death,  
 my old books having been lost in moving, so my  
 statements are wholly from memory.

Q. What was the immediate cause of the soldier's death?

A. Tuberculous disease of the lungs, with which he had been
