DEPOSITION *v.*Case of *Emeline Jolley*, No. 227,082

On this *twenty seventh* day of *November*, 188*4*, at  
*Baltimore*, County of *Baltimore*  
 State of *Maryland*, before me, *J. H. Simpson*, a  
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared  
*Mrs Mary Henry*, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer  
 truly all interrogatories propounded to her during this Special Examination of afore-  
 said pension claim, deposes and says: that her age is *38* years; that  
 she is by occupation a *Laundress*  
 that her post-office address and place of residence  
 is *No 212 Sharp Street Baltimore Md.*  
 and that she was acquainted with the deceased  
 soldier, *John Jolley*, late Private Co. "D," 7<sup>th</sup> Regt,  
 U. S. C., from about the time of his discharge from  
 said service up to the time of his death, and  
 that she has been acquainted with the claimant  
*Emeline Jolley*, widow of the deceased soldier, from  
 the time she, deponent, was a small girl; that  
 claimant's maiden name was *Mitchell*; that she  
 was never married until she was married to  
 the deceased soldier; that she lived with him  
 from the time of their marriage up to the date of his  
 death, and that she has not remarried since his  
 death occurred. Claimant had no children by deceased  
 soldier.

- Q. What was the deceased soldier's physical condition  
 when you first knew him subsequent to discharge?  
 A. When I first knew him he had then just come  
 home from the army and was boarding at  
*Thomas Mitchell*, now deceased, on *High Street*,  
 bet. *Hammer & Charles Street*. He then was in poor  
 health and had a bad cough and continued to have  
 this cough up to the date of his death. He always  
 had a consumptive appearance. He appeared to gradually  
 grow worse until he died of consumption as I was
