DEPOSITION *W*

Case of *Emeline Jolley*, No. 227,082,

On this *twenty eighth* day of *November*, 188*4*, at
Baltimore, County of *Baltimore*

State of *Maryland*, before me, *J. H. Simpson*, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared

Daniel W. Young, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
 said pension claim, deposes and says: *that his age is 42 years;*

that he is by occupation a grocer;
that his post-office address and place of residence
is No. Annapolis, Ann Arundel Co. Baltimore, Md.
and that he was acquainted with the deceased
soldier John Jolley, late Private Co. "D." 7th Regt.
U.S. C. T. from about the time of his enlistment
in the fall of 1863 up to the date of his discharge
in October 1866, deponent being a Supt. of Co.
"I" and Supt. Major of said Regt. during said
period of service.

Q. *What was the deceased soldier's physical condition*
while you knew him?

A. *I first became acquainted with him at Camp*
Benedict, Md. in Sept. 1863. He and myself
belonged to the same squad of recruits at
said camp and he cooked for us until I
was assigned to Company "I" and he to Co. "H,"
and I always kept track of him after that
while in the service. When I first knew him he was
a hearty healthy man strong and hale. He was
then probably 35 to 40 years of age. He continued
in this condition with the exception of a diarrhoea
he had at Camp Benedict, Md. which we attributed to
sourcamp water - up to about the time we left Camp
Benedict in March 1864. From about that time he
was weakly and in poor health right along
going to sick call frequently, and complaining
