

DEPOSITION X.

Case of Emeline Jolley, No. 227,082

On this twenty eighth day of November, 1884, at
Baltimore, County of Baltimore
 State of Maryland, before me, J. H. Simpson, a
 Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared

Nathan Johnson, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer
 truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of afore-
 said pension claim, deposes and says: that his age is 41 years;

that he is by occupation a teamster;
 that his post office address and place of residence
 is No 76 Morris Alley, Baltimore, Md. and that
 he was acquainted with John Jolley, deceased,
 late Private Co. D. 7th Regt. U.S.C. from the time
 of his, the deceased soldier's, enlistment up to about
 the time of his death, deponent being a member
 of said Company.

Q. What was the deceased soldier's physical con-
 dition when you first became acquainted with
 him?

A. It was good and he was always ready for duty
 up to the the time of our fight at Fort Fisher, Va.,
 Sept. 29/64. I was captured at that place, and he
 was wounded in his right arm at the same time,
 I did not know that he had been wounded though
 until I was released from prison at the close of
 the war and met him in hospital at near Fort
 Monroe, Va. just after the surrender of Richmond, Va.
 When I met him in hospital he was in poor
 health, I think he rejoined us at Powder Horn
 Texas, some time in the fall of 1865.

Q. How did he appear to be affected when you
 met him in hospital, and in Texas?

A. Well he had a bad cough and appeared to be
 sickly at the hospital, and when he joined me
 in Texas he was still scrawny and had a bad
