Private of U.S.C. resident of 72 S. Anne St County of
Baltimore and State of Maryland, to me well known, and whom I certify to be
respectable and intelligent, and entitled to full credit and belief, and who being duly sworn according to law, declared that

he has personal and perfect knowledge that
his comrade John Jolly was prostrated with
cough, pains in his breast and disease of the
lungs at ^{or near Petersburg} Pa, about July 1864 which so
inflicted him for duty as a soldier that he
relieved of duty & detailed in cook house. Even this
was too much for him as his disease was changing
into Consumption; coughing terribly & spitting
blood frequently; he was sent to the hospital.
He was a good soldier, a moral and strictly
temperate man & always (when his health
permitted) ready for duty. His disease in
the affiant's opinion originated from exposure
while in line of duty. When his com-
pany left for Texas John Jolly remained
in the hospital from where he believes he was
discharged. At the time they left Jolly was
decidedly consumptive, weak & but a wreck.
