

working together in the sugar refinery. I know nothing about his marriage - he was married in 1869, but I did not know it at that time. I did not know his wife until afterwards. I knew her first after their first child was born. They both belonged at Annapolis. I have known her ever since, but have not seen her for some time. The last I knew of her she was living at 1515 Fremont Ave. Prior to that she lived on Lee St. near the railroad. I cannot say whether she has remarried - she had not remarried when I last saw her, about eighteen months ago. I cannot tell who his physician was. For several years prior to his death he was not able to do much - was coughing and was running down - looked weak and appeared like a consumptive. I knew him well all the time until he died. I got him a place in an asylum house, but he could not stand the work - he tried to work occasionally but could not do much.

No, the widow has not lived with or cohabited with any man as wife or mistress since her husband died that I ever heard of. When she lived on Lee St. I knew her well, and she was living with her children, and taking in washing.

I do not know James W. Williams.

I made an affidavit in this case. I did not intend to state that I knew him to have a cough from 1869 until death. As before stated I did not notice his cough until we worked together at the Chrome works about 1872. I have been correctly reported.
