Personally came before me, a Justice of the Peace in and for aforesaid County
and State, Abraham Savage, aged 52 years
and No 13, Howe Court, aged year
citizen of the Town of Baltimore, County of Baltimore, State of
Post Office Address, Maryland

Maryland, well known to me to be reputable and entitled to credit, and who,
being duly sworn, declare in relation to aforesaid case, as follows:

Ca. F. 9th Regt U.S.C.T. That he was a private
for duty with his Command in all of the engage-
ments with his Regt, during the Great Campaign
in Virginia in 1864 and 1865.

That he was intimately acquainted with
the Claimant Madison Hemmell who was
also present for duty with his Command
for duty in the fight at Deep Bottom
Virginia in July 1864, and does recollect
the fact that the said Madison Hemmell
was struck by a piece of shell in said
battle, soon when he was struck
he was knocked senseless. The Defendant
helped carry the Claimant off of the field
the wound was on the right side, near
the hip, it was bleeding, can't tell the full
extent of the injury. Never saw him
again until the year 1866. After his Regt
was discharged from the Army, he then
met the Claimant in Baltimore Md. The
Claimant then walked home, and appeared to
be in pain, which he stated was the result of
his wound as aforesaid; The Defendant also
noticed that the Claimant was partially deaf
which he stated had been caused by the bursting
shell when he was wounded. The Claimant
left Baltimore Md. about 1867, and was away for about
15 years. About the year 1882, met the Claimant
again.

Further declare that he has no interest in said case and is not concerned in
its prosecution. he was still deaf and complaining
of the shell wound. That he has no interest
in the claim.
