Jacob Heath has no relatives in Kent county at present. He was never a slave. I dont know who knew him on Kent Island. There was a colored family on the island who ran a boarding house where Mr Heath and I spent several weeks about twenty years ago and their name was Heath though not related to my husbands family. I forget the location of that family or where we got off the train to reach their house. Jacob Heath had a brother named Roderack Heath who lived in Wilmington at one time and I saw him once and know that he is dead - do not know whether he left a wife or any children. And there was a sister named Lizzie Wheeler who was a widow when I knew her and she died in this city 12 or 13 years ago and left no children. I cannot name any army comrades of Jacob Heath. As to who has known him the longest I will name the following: Shederick Johnson of Whatcoat st, a driver, and Isaiah Brown of 1307 Division st, and Johnsons right name may be Perry Johnson. I never met any of the soldier friends of Jacob Heath. And Perry Johnson has a brother named Shederick Johnson come to think of it who knew Mr Heath a long time back. The first and second wives of Jacob Heath were sisters and Isaiah Brown is a brother of those two wives. Sadonia Mason has no brothers or sisters to my knowledge. The following persons have known me ever since I became of a marriageable age: Emma Harris of Dolphin st and Mary Tibbs of the same street, and I have an old fellow servant in this city of the name of George Satchell who knew me in Accomac county in childhood though we do not see each other very often. I do not know the address of George Satchell but he is a pensioner. Mary Maker of W Franklin street, it is near Myrtle ave, in Baltimore has known me ever since I was a child almost. I had no children in the World War and I have no claim to the benefits of the War Risk Insurance Act.
