Case of Annie M. Heath

On this 11 day of February, 1922, at Baltimore county of Baltimore City, State of Maryland before me, W. H. Stovall, a Special Examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared Perry W. Johnson, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says:

1 I am 66 years old, occupation driver, and post office  
2 address 912 Whatcoat st, Baltimore Md.

3 I have lived in Baltimore about fifty years and my  
4 home was on Kent Island Md prior to coming here.

5 I knew Jacob Heath <sup>on</sup> Kent Island when I was a boy and he  
6 was a friend of my mother and I had a brother to serve  
7 in the army with him. I cannot recall Heaths parents  
8 or other members of his family but I believe I knew his  
9 father. Jacob Heath came to Baltimore before I came, he  
10 came here shortly after his discharge from the army. I  
11 have been his friend all along the line since coming to  
12 Baltimore, have not lived far from Heath since coming to  
13 Baltimore. On Kent Island he lived on some place not far  
14 from my owner Samuel White of Stevensville post office.  
15 On - interlined in line 5 at this stage.

16 Q. Who was the first wife of Jacob Heath?

17 A. It was Frederica Brown of Baltimore the sister of  
18 Isaiah Brown of Baltimore whom I have known a long time.  
19 I cannot recall the date of this marriage though I knew  
20 of it at the time it took place and it was soon after the  
21 old war. Jacob Heath had no wife on Kent Island I could  
22 hear anything about though I was just a boy when he lived  
23 on Kent and can barely recollect him. Frederica Heath  
24 was his first wife I feel sure and she died in Baltimore  
25 and then Heath was married to her sister whose name possi-  
26 bly was Harriet and she was the widow of another man at  
27 date of her marriage to Jacob Heath. Harriet is dead is
