A. She had no right to my right as I was not married to her. I took up with Annie Satchell and lived with her without thinking about it very much, we were not bothered with thinking about it, and we got tired of each other and broke up. I wanted to bring my father home to live with me and she objected and left me and that is all there is to it. I have been married twice since then, first to mary Dailey who died and then to Mary Clara Harris who is still living with me in the relation of a wife.
