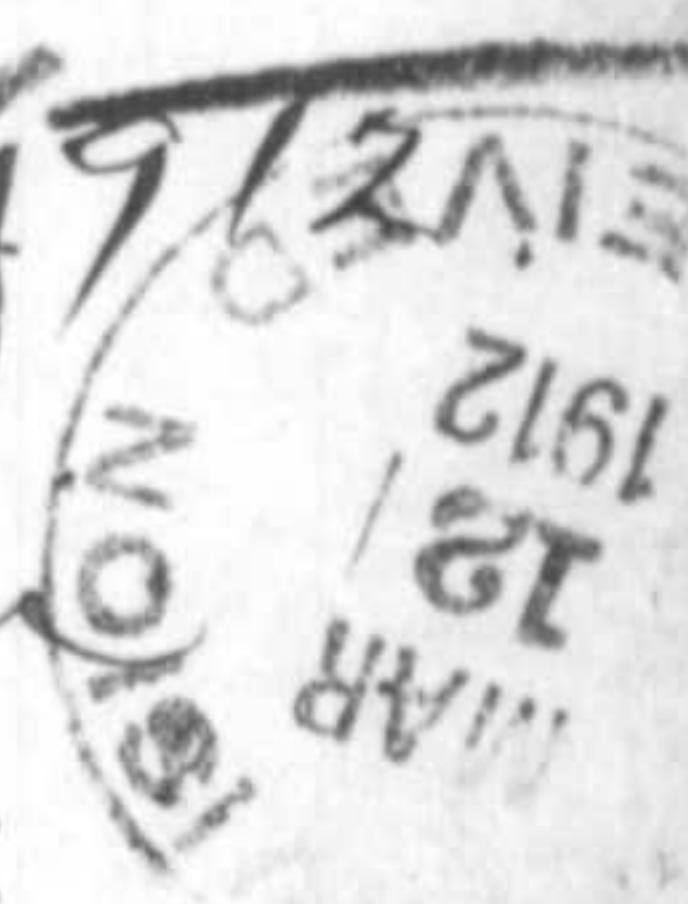
and made oath in due form of law that I am well and personally acquainted

 her for her support. He is not an inmate of any home or
 institution, I know that her husband deserted her about
 September 1901, he had not been treating her properly and
 in August 1901, she reported him to the police authorities
 he became angry and that no doubt was the reason he
 deserted her. Several times before pension day he would
 call and promise to give her money, but never did give
