I am 59 years old, occupation house girl, and post office

address ELICOTT CITY Md. John Hall, colored, formerly of

this place was my uncle, my mother Martha Brown brother, and

he died here in ELICOTT CITY something like twelve years ago

and I saw him buried at Mount Gilbert Cemetery, and his wife

Mary Williams is also dead, she died six months or so ago.

Uncle John Hall had only one wife within my recollection, he

use to go with Eliza Gordon and they had several children but

were not married and did not live together. Those children

took our family name because Eliza liked my mother so well. I

knew Eliza Gordon when I was a child living with my parents in

Mission Bottom in ELICOTT CITY and she worked for Anne Collier

and Miss Lizzie Hunt as a cook, and was never married at this place

or in this vicinity since the war at least. That she did after

going to Baltimore I do not know. I never knew Amos Jackson.

Eliza Gordon left this town for Baltimore almost forty years

ago and I have not seen her more than once since, and am not re-

lated to her and have no interest in this case. Your questions

were understood and my answers are recorded correctly in this

deposition which I have heard read.
