

James A. Jackson. Jackson and his wife did not live together as man and wife very long, cant say just how many years, but it was'nt more than five or six years. He come back and forth to see her up to going to the Soldiers Home; his home was in this city after my acquaintance with him began except when in the Home. He was in the West before his marriage, and a policeman at some place out there he said. I do not know who could tell you of his early life and history, dont know who served with him in the army or anything about that myself. I have no pecuniary interest in this case and not related to claimant, we are old friends and I hope she gets a pension. In my former statement before the Justice, which I was sworn to I had in mind hearing that Amos Jackson was married to the Weeks woman but I dont know anything about the matter personally, and I dont believe the report. Eliza herself is the person I heard it from. Eliza had a son named William H. Brown but I do not know who was his father. She had two or three children by Mr Jackson and thats all I know anything about. The son Henry mentioned in the first of this deposition is identical with that William H. Brown. Oh yes I am positive that James A Jackson and Eliza Jackson were never divorced in Baltimore, my acquaintance with her has been so intimate I would have been the first person almost to have heard of any action of that kind in Court. Your questions were understood and my answers are recorded correctly in this deposition which I have heard read.
